From the Home Front

I have been a fan of the comedian Tracey Ullman since she first appeared on our television screens in the 1970s. She emigrated to the United States in the 1980s and has been well known as a comedian, singer, actress, screenwriter, producer, director and author.

She has recently returned to British television screens with her own sketch show on a Friday night. One of the characters in her sketches has been quite an eye opener for me. In one sketch a lady is having a job interview for a high flying science post. The interviewer comments on how thrilled they are to have the opportunity to employ someone like her, with such an amazing track record, experience and glowing references and he is in the process of offering her the post, when she makes an offhand mention about church. Suddenly the interviewer's face clouds over and he enquires what she means – she says she is a Christian and he starts to bluster and he calls in a colleague. This colleague affirms how excited they are to have the opportunity to employ this lady and what an asset she will be to the company. The male interviewer points out the prospective employee is a Christian and immediately this colleague's attitude changes and she begins to back pedal too. It is obvious this eminently suitable person has suddenly become unemployable...because she is a professing Christian! The candidate asks if her being a Christian is a problem, which both the interviewers refute! However she withdraws her application and as she leaves the interviewers both fawningly apologise, to which she replies with a smile 'Don't worry - I forgive you!' When she has left the room the two turn to each and exclaim "That was a lucky escape, what a nutter!"

Frightening thought eh - or increasingly true?

Frequently as Christians we are perceived by some members of society as 'nutters' or 'wierdos' – how did we manage to attract such bad publicity and how has it stuck? Do we need to own up more vocally to our core beliefs and flag up those living and working real Christian lives? Should we be emphasising the compassionate role Christians play supporting the sick, homeless, addicts, the support for the bereaved and those caught in the benefits traps, aid to asylum seekers? Has the bad publicity in the media around historical child abuse in churches, attitudes towards the gay community and women priests plus religious differences concerning abortion and contraception, tarred all Christians with the same brush?

Or is Tracey Ullman having a pop at general intolerances which are being stoked up in present day society, bolstered by false and exaggerated reporting and scaremongering? How do we now view and treat immigrants, the disabled, the long term sick, the old, those who are perceived to be 'different' in any way? They are increasingly portrayed as spongers, taking our jobs, malingers, benefit-cheats, bed blocking in hospitals.....

It made me stop and think – but then that is what satirical comedy should make us do!!! **J.A.R.**

Talking Jesus



Well, after months of anticipation, it finally happened. On the long weekend of Thursday 2nd – Sunday 5th March, 25 bishops from across the North of England, led by the Archbishop of York John Sentamu, descended on Durham Diocese. Between them (and with the assistance of their teams!) they attended 450 events. Here are some Hartlepool highlights, and what we might learn:

Things to Celebrate

There were over 400 people at Durham cathedral for the commissioning service, and over 900 at the closing celebration, where John Sentamu preached. This far exceeded expectations!

A total of 20 people hosted in local Christians' homes (7 from Newcastle, 7 from Cranmer Hall, 6 from Saltmine Theatre Company...!)



Over 100 students (aged 15–18) heard John Sentamu speak at the FE College on the place of faith in the public square, and then answer questions (including comparing himself in his black cape to Darth Vader, in answer to a question about new religions such as Jediism!). The *Hartlepool Mail* carried an article ahead of time, and one in follow-up.



St Hild's School hall was filled with people watching *Darkness Falls*, a gritty, imaginative, and very moving performance of John's Gospel by Saltmine. If you didn't make it, ask someone who did!

The men's group had its largest attendance in memory to hear Mark Tanner, Bishop of Berwick, speaking about motorbikes and faith (the key to both is: keep the engine running!) and his red-light district church's ministry to prostitutes.

Some great and really creative events out and about in the community: a photo exhibition in the People's Centre on the theme "Peace and Joy in

Hartlepool”; a “God-o-meter” on York Road; pottery painting in Hartlepotz; a pub trail with questions for the visiting teams to ask locals, ending up with prayer at St Aidan’s Church; a couple of litter picks.

It is also worth recognizing that every Anglican church in town was involved in some way, however big or small – and that is a huge achievement and promising for our future cooperation in God’s work.

Something to Learn

“Jesus is for life, not just for a weekend”. Remember those adverts, “A dog is for life, not just for Christmas”? Well, we could say the same about outreach and sharing our faith. Talking Jesus doesn’t finish just because the weekend has finished. Let’s keep looking and praying for opportunities to speak about Jesus, what he has done, what he means to us, what God is doing today. And, from time to time, it would be great if more events like this could happen – maybe not all in one weekend, though that can be a good thing to do from time to time. But to have an event to which non-Christian friends and family can be invited, and at which a faith story or testimony is shared, is a brilliant spur and help to us as we try to share Jesus. The next event we have coming up is Bishop Paul’s prayer walk on 1st, 2nd, 4th June – why not go out to meet him, and take a friend?!

Anyone who witnessed the event cannot have failed to be moved by the depiction of Jesus' final days and resurrection. A capacity crowd sat in often stunned silence at the artful way the Gospel was brought to life. It portrayed His miracles then subsequent suffering in a relevant and imaginative way for our 21st century lives.

On a lighter note, on the Saturday morning, many of us enjoyed the...

Mens' Breakfast. This was held at the Duke of Cleveland pub over on The Headland. We gathered for a full english and to hear +Mark Tanner talk to us. He was a busy lad that weekend! +Mark discussed what it is to be a Christian in our modern world, and techno geeks note, used his iWatch to manage his screen presentation; very impressive. Many of us were particularly taken with his time as a vicar in the red light district of Doncaster; believe me, shockingly, it does exist. Chris & Ros Smith News #8 February 2017

October to February!?! How did that gap happen? Well, for reasons to do with the following.....

Work situation

Last time we mentioned the Reception class that Chris was beginning to work with for three weeks. Well, **three months later** it was *still* his job! It has taken a long while for that particular teacher to be able to resume full time work, and her health situation is still not completely settled.

Chris has been very busy with a job that has claimed much more time and energy than he originally anticipated. After all, this did include the run up to Christmas (can't share any pictures of it though, sorry)!! The school has been very appreciative of the continuity their Reception class had, and we have in turn been relieved to have the settled work and salary. **God has been good to us!**

The next couple of months will be much less settled work-wise. Chris may yet be needed by that class should their teacher fall ill again. Meantime, once more fragmented day-to-day assignments will become the norm.

Family situation

Getting boys to two separate schools has been more gruelling than we expected, especially for Ros. Bouncy boys at 7:30 am in the car is not always fun. We have found ourselves involved with the life of the family of one of Aden's school friends, whose mother was expecting twins at the same time as she had to walk her two sons to school. Lots of school-related lifts around Chesham ensued. Aden has just turned 8 years old, which led to lots of events and outings.

It has also been quite hard to get the situation of Chris' mum Sylvia settled and finalised as we would like. We still have a couple of strong preferences. Sylvia's current setting is technically very good but lacks the kind of social connections she really enjoys and needs to be happy and content, which is our priority.

Even so, it is tricky to get up north frequently to help sort out the family home, it being so far away. Clearance and sale of the property to pay for mum's care is taking a long time, and is a sensitive subject. Chris' sister has been far from well, which has again slowed down the pace of events.

School situation

At one point it seemed as though Faith International Academy in Davao had Chris as a classroom teacher as their prime invitation to return and work. Consequently, Ros is in the process of developing a women's livelihood project called "soapandstory", the idea being to teach women how to make soap which they can use with their families. They can also sell it to provide an income or to purchase books for a local community library or education project. Last month Ros attended a soap making course, and is about to make her first batch at home. More info

can be found at **soapandstory.com**

In addition, however, Ros is being asked by FIA if she is still available to assist with her library related skills. It certainly does show that there is a place for us to be useful in Davao if we get there! Which leads to....

Financial support situation

The other side of being busy with day to day work has of course been a lack of time to commit to speaking at meetings to do with going back to the Philippines. We need to explain what the ministry need is to more people. Yes, there is without doubt a financial element but this is the crucial door to test, to see how it is opening for us to return.

At the moment, Teach Beyond is in receipt of some ongoing gifts for our Philippines ministry from mission partners, both church and individuals. **We need to grow this urgently.**

The setting with Teach Beyond is quite different to how things worked before – gifts that begin now will help to purchase plane travel to Asia to get us started teaching – TB does not have any budget for buying our flights.

We may not have been completely clear on this point before, but it is necessary for people who are wanting to partner with us, to help in this teaching and serving ministry to begin (maybe begin again) as soon as possible.

Please also pray that we will begin to get opportunities and invitations to share and speak. If any of your fellowship or church groups have a sudden speaker cancellation in any meetings soon, Chris is very willing to step in!!

Our heart situation

We have wondered a lot about the slowness of these events. In part we can only blame ourselves for not finding the time to write to everyone and keep you up to date for prayer. However we get joy from unexpected gifts from others just as busy as ourselves, which encourages us to keep going with this teaching ministry quest. We hope to be travelling back for the new school year in Davao (August) but that means having new mission partners and flights booked to travel. **It's a big prayer challenge!**

Redmire 2017

On Monday 13th February four carloads of sleeping bags, warm clothes, food, Bibles, games, a guitar, and young people and leaders, set off on an intrepid journey into deepest darkest Yorkshire. 70 minutes later we arrived at the cosy, friendly, and wonderful cabins and Granary Barn at the Jonas Centre in Redmire (now with WiFi!). We were there for 3 nights, and got up to all sorts: football, Bible studies, chasing sheep, films, bonfire, a walk, games at Easby Abbey, prayer and worship, time in Richmond, icecream at Brymor, prayer barn...



Our Bible studies took a look at some of the events in Joseph's life. The theme verse was "I cannot do it, but God will" (Genesis 41.16). As we looked at the highs and the lows in Joseph's life we saw how even when circumstances or other people mean to harm us, God can use that for good (Genesis 50.20) – we connected this with the cross, which was the most evil and horrendous thing that people have ever done, and yet God used it for good, defeating death and making forgiveness possible.

The Fallen of Stranton Remembered 100 years on
This month marks the deaths of two Strantonians.

2nd Lieutenant Donald Ord Ross


As you walk into Stranton Church look to your left and you will see a window dedicated to 2nd Lieutenant Ross, he fought with the 6th battalion Cameron Highlanders at the battle of Arras and died on 11th April 1917.

Donald joined the call to arms in August 1914. He left a widow Anne Teresa Ord, to whom he left in probate £270 and 9 shillings'

Death in The Med Private Frank Coutlas

He served in the Royal Army Service Corps were dispatched to serve in the Middle East. On the journey from Marseille to Alexandria in Egypt on board the HMS Cameronia the ship was torpedoed by U Boat-33 about 150 miles from Malta.

HMS Cameronia



There were 2,650 soldiers aboard at the time and 210, including Frank, lost their lives as the ship sank in less 40 minutes. He is remembered on the Chatby Memorial in Alexandria

Mary Baines' quick recipes revisited

Microwave minted pea & ham soup

1 ¼ pints chicken stock
2 Tablespoons cream
1 lb frozen minted peas
2oz ham finely chopped
Pinch sugar



Place stock & peas in a large bowl, cover & cook on high for 10 minutes.
Liquidise or puree the soup. Stir in cream, sugar & ham & serve at once.

Salmon Pie

Medium tin of salmon
½ lb mushrooms – sliced
Large onion sliced finely
Butter for frying
Salt & pepper



Sufficient frozen flaky pastry to line & top 8" pie dish

Fry onion & sliced mushrooms in butter

Roll half of pastry to cover bottom of greased dish

Place half the mushrooms, then the salmon, lightly seasoned, then the remainder of the mushrooms & onions on the top

Cover with remaining pastry (brush with milk for golden colour)

Bake in hot oven until golden brown

Chocolate mallow crisps

4oz miniature marshmallows
2oz butter
8oz chocolate
1oz chopped nuts of your choice
1oz chopped dates or apricots
3oz rice krispies



Melt the butter over a low heat

Melt the chocolate over a pan of hot water (or two minutes in the microwave)

Then add chocolate to the butter

Stir in the remaining ingredients including the rice krispies until well coated

Spread mixture into a greased baking tray

Chill then cut into bars

Keep bars in airtight tin to keep crisp.
