# What kind of God?

Give thanks for our Christian schools (mainly Church of England and Roman Catholic schools), including Ward Jackson Primary School and St Hild's Secondary School. In most schools, children are taught about "British Values", facts about different religions and the importance of having respect of people from different cultures and faith traditions, but very little about God. Opportunities to teach children bible stories and help them understand the love of God are precious and we give thanks for the good relations we have with all the schools in our parish and for the volunteers who lead children's and young people's work in Stranton and Burbank Churches.

At the beginning of June we had two of the milestones in the Christian year: Pentecost and Trinity Sunday. These festivals help us to reflect on God himself – what is he like? My reflection is that there is only one God, but that different religions teach different things about how he has revealed himself to us. Jews (the first tribe on earth to understand there is only one God, who sought a special relationship with the Jews) believe he made himself known through his Law, handed down to Moses on tablets of stone. Muslims believe he is known through the words dictated (in Arabic) to the prophet Mohammed. Hindus and Buddhists see God in all life, indeed all things, and learn about him through stories and traditions handed down many generations from wise men. Sikhs have a "middle way" based on teaching handed down from their 10 gurus from the 15<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup> Centuries.

As Christians we believe and proclaim that God has given himself to us in the form of a human being, Jesus of Nazareth, who died a criminal's death and was raised to life and is glorified with God himself. He is not only just and merciful (which is what the other monotheistic faiths teach) but he also loves every person with a sacrificial, forgiving love and continues to involve himself in our world as the Holy Spirit through the Church – the community of people who follow him in the Way of Jesus Christ.

Reflecting on God himself, what does that do to your expectations when we come together on the first day of the week to celebrate that he raised our humanity in Jesus from the dead and offer him our worship?

# From The Home Front

It is always good to feel the hand of God on our lives, especially when the challenges of life have become extreme and emotionally exhausting. Readers will know we have been very worried about my Dad over recent months, as his health took a nosedive. His stay in hospital resulted in him becoming quite ill, depressed and ready to give up! As a family we were distraught, feeling we were letting him down, as he was stuck on a ward where care was minimal and nothing more was being done medically and I was told it would take several weeks for the discharge procedure to happen! It was at this point where I broke down and cried in our bathroom; that I finally surrendered the problem to God, acknowledging that I could not continue in my own strength, but knew that I could put my trust in my heavenly Father to bring about a resolution to the situation. God provided me with strong prayer partners for support and 'things happened'...

The Discharge Liaison Officer at the hospital suddenly seemed to understand my need for urgent action. She worked with Social Workers and made herself a nuisance with doctors, nursing and physio staff to gather all the required medical information in order to find an appropriate placement. With the clock ticking – I needed to know Dad was somewhere caring and in Hartlepool, before I could leave on a long planned (and much needed) holiday abroad, I was politely persistent making phone calls to all relevant parties every day. After waiting all day for transport back to Hartlepool – which hadn't been ordered....., the lovely Liaison Officer booked the ambulance and even put my Dad on board, before phoning me so I could meet him as he arrived in the rehabilitation unit in Hartlepool - twelve hours before my flight.... The staff there were immediately caring, kind and compassionate, ensuring Dad was settled, comfortable and had everything to hand. They listened and noted our concerns about his massive weight loss, because he had stopped eating, and his unhappy mental state. Food supplements were proffered immediately and Dad gulped them down with pleasure. Nurses came and talked to him positively and explained how he would be looked after and his role in order to help himself to be able to return to his own home; giving him back control over his life. They encouraged him to shave and dress each day and sit out of bed - at last he was Ron the man and not just a patient to be treated. He had his dignity back.

I left knowing he was in safe hands. I returned to find 'my Dad' – the cheeky joker, who enjoys a good chat and reminisces about Hartlepool as it was, the War, working on ships most of his life, my Mum and his large family, enjoys a tot of whiskey and treats to eat. He is now eating proper food and his face has filled out; he looks much healthier and is planning his return home!

God just requires that we step out in faith and trust Him. He is the God of the impossible and His strength is immense. He touches lives when we turn to him.

# Bishop Paul's Prayer Walk in Hartlepool

## Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> – Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> June

The walks featured an opportunity for the Bishop to meet people from across the Hartlepool Areas; Walking, Talking, and Praying with them. This year marks the third year of prayer walks in an eight year cycle walking across all sixteen deaneries of the Diocese – two deaneries per year.

Bishop Paul said: "I was delighted with the response and welcome I received everywhere I visited." Particularly poignant this year were the terror attacks in Manchester and London. In both cases there were opportunities to speak and pray about the importance of community, love and fellowship amongst different people from all faiths and none in our communities.

"As in previous years, it's the stories of people and their communities that never cease to amaze me. There is real passion and commitment here. I hope the prayer walks go some way to bring these forward so we can celebrate the good in our communities, and keep praying for them, then that is exactly why I love doing these annual prayer walks."

During the Prayer walks, Bishop Paul has visited schools; community projects; civic locations; fire, rescue and RNLI facilities; sporting and cultural centres; churches; other faith leaders and their communities; as well as a whole host of local people in their places of work and leisure. Bishop Paul also got to try his hand at Golf; Cricket; Singing; and taking the helm of an all-weather offshore Life Boat. At Hartlepool Football Club he was given a tour of the grounds and presented with a Club scarf.



Bishop Paul added: "One highlight for me was to be able to join up with the Great Big Walk during our time in Hartlepool. This gave us a great opportunity to walk, talk and pray for the work being done and to discover some of the tireless community engagement that they were showcasing.

"This has been a fantastic two weeks – and I can't wait to do it all over again next year in two new areas."

As a special treat, Mrs Wilson arranged afterwards for the children to have a guided tour and a delicious afternoon tea at St Chad's College.



## **Short background history of Kilimatinde Hospital**

**The Rev Canon Ralph Banks**, a missionary from Manchester, United Kingdom, founded Kilimatinde Hospital. The Anglican Diocese of Central Tanganyika (DCT), consisting of the Dodoma and Singida regions, originally owned Kilimatinde Hospital.

In 1971, the hospital became a Designated District Hospital (DDH), making it eligible to receive grants-in-aid from the government to fund its operations.

In 1991, the DCT was divided into two dioceses. The original DCT serves the Dodoma region.

The new Diocese of the Rift Valley (DRV), originally under the leadership of Bishop Dr Alpha Mohamed, serves the Manyoni and Singida regions.

In the same year, the Kilimatinde Hospital lost its DDH status when the government converted the health centre in Manyoni town to an official District Hospital, withdrew its qualified seconded staff from Kilimatinde Hospital, and posted them to the Manyoni Hospital.


Kilimatinde relies on donations to support the provision of health care in the region.

The region is semi desert, prone to food crisis, water shortages and poverty. The people are isolated from services by distance, lack of funds and lack of transport, rendering them vulnerable and at risk of early death. When patients arrive at the hospital their condition is fragile from traveling and lack of nourishment. There is a cost to treatment and often when people arrive they are unable to pay. Food is not provided at the hospital, though a charitable food fund has been set up to assist the poorest cases.

Visiting the new Wards 2012, these are now in use.



# St John's Seminary and Secondary School

**Transformed lives: through education and the love of Christ.**

Since becoming the Head Master in 2010 Festo Kanungha has been working at transforming the lives of the pupils through education and the love of Christ.

Their exam results took the school to third in the region and nationally to 198 out of 3280, a vast improvement on years gone by. Not only is the school improving academically, but also in its sense of community and unity amongst staff and students. Well done to all the Pupils, Staff and the Head Master. Currently the school has 270 students, 30 teachers and other members of staff.

The students receive the full spectrum of academic subjects including bible knowledge from form 1-4. The school also teaches additional VETA courses in Tailoring and Mechanics.

As well as in their studying, students at St. John's learn valuable life skills such as; Leadership, Pastoral care, Church leadership, husbandry, management, store keeping, book keeping.

**Volunteers and Volunteer Accommodation.** The School Bible College and the Nursery School take Volunteers from around the world on short and long term placements.

## **Challenges**

Too few dormitories and many in need of repair.

Too few classrooms – we now require two classrooms for each form.

No library

Monthly cost of electricity and water

The school hopes to install a fully functional computer room, a water harvester and solar power system.

The school also intends to build up their school projects which it is hoped will help them to be self-sufficient. Currently these include looking after pigs, cows and goats and a school garden. A school guesthouse is also planned.

# Clive Hall Update

I went to the Bishops Advisory Panel on the 15-17<sup>th</sup> May. It was in Ely near Cambridge.

It was a rather intense three days, yet also encouraging and affirming. So there were a number of mixed emotions. The first day started with Evening Prayer which I found very peaceful. Then we had one hour to answer some personal questions about ourselves. This is done in an exam style way, no talking and a time limit etc... I did not come across any questions which were too difficult to answer.

Then we were given a Pastoral exercise to do. This is a letter given to you outlining a pastoral problem which you then had to write a letter responding to the situation. I felt my experience of community work and the pastoral work I already do really helped me in this situation.

The second day we all had to give a presentation of 5 minutes length, about one of the criteria for Ordination. I picked Spiritually and took with me pictures of Andy Murray playing tennis and holding the cup and one picture where he was in an ice bath. I connected the pictures to being disciplined and hard working to become a spiritual person. After the presentation you had to chair a discussion on the subject for 11 minutes (they do say TIME - and you have to stop!). The final part was to summarise the discussion for a further 2 minutes. Those 2 minutes felt like a very long time to fill, but with a bit of divine waffling I was the only person in our group who filled the whole two minutes.

By this point I felt things were going ok and I felt relaxed and happy. Then the interviews started - three of them in total. I was nervous, especially in the first one, but the advisor was calm and patient and even when a question stumped me, they gave me the time to reflect on it and I managed the answer eventually. I came out feeling it had gone well. Much to my surprise I also came out of interviews two and three feeling they had gone really well too.

So I came home feeling very happy about the whole situation. I was told it would be two weeks before I would hear anything. On Friday 26<sup>th</sup> May Angela was meant to go to York. She said I am not going! I feel you will get your letter today. The post man came and he had one letter with a Durham diocese mark on it. I opened the letter from Bishop Mark and it said 'You are recommended for Ordination'. It went on to say the Panel feel things had gone well for you while there. So what I sensed had gone well, had!!


What happens now is I will start Ordinand training with Lindisfarne College in September. This is based in Cuthbert House in Durham. Then in 2018 on the 1<sup>st</sup> July. I will be licensed in Durham Cathedral. I will then do two years as a curate in Stranton Church. The role I am taking on is a Non Stipendiary role so I will continue to be employed by and work for Stranton Church. I will run Burbank Church and everything else that is on my 20 things I do list, on another page in this magazine. Being a curate will be number 21!!!

The Bishop took his seat at the east end flanked by members of the College of Canons and the new Canons were officially presented and welcomed. 

# Strantonians in WW1

These two Strantonian soldiers died a 100 years ago.

Pioneer John Edward Goldsborough enrolled in September 1914 and died of wounds on the 5<sup>th</sup> July 1917. Although his death was announced on July 17<sup>th</sup> in the Northern Daily Mail. Pioneer Goldsborough was 21 years old and was mourned by his family and fiancée Hetty.

The family chose the epitaph 'he died that we might live'

His is parents of 19 Harrow Street, West Hartlepool received official news and a message of sympathy from Lieutenant Morris who said that the deceased soldier had only been in the company a short time (a very arduous time), but he had become a favourite with the officers and men.

He is buried at Birr Cross Roads Cemetery in Belgium.




## Corporal George Lewis Morris

The corporal served in the Gloucestershire's and was wounded on 2<sup>nd</sup> October 1916. He lived at 15 Benson Street.

He recuperated and returned to the front but on 23<sup>rd</sup> July 1917 died from his wounds.

His Grandmother who lived at 33 Jackson Street received the official letter. He is buried at Mendingham Military Cemetery, Belgium, a plan of which is below. He can be found in row 35.
