Which name describes you?

As Jesus and his disciples were on their way, he came to a village where a woman named Martha opened her home to him.³⁹ She had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet listening to what he said.⁴⁰ But Martha was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made. She came to him and asked, "Lord, don't you care that my sister has left me to do the work by myself? Tell her to help me!"⁴¹ "Martha, Martha," the Lord answered, "you are worried and upset about many things,⁴² but few things are needed—or indeed only one. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her." Luke 10:38-42

I read the verses above and thought about the two different personalities of the two people in the story.

There is Mary, she is good at talking to people and also a great listener. She is a people person likes to be in a group and involved in the conversation. She has learnt that she has two ears to listen and one mouth to talk with, which means we should listen twice as much as we talk!

Then there is Martha. She is someone who plans the party and make sure there is food and when you attend the party you will always find her in the kitchen. She sees a job and does it. She has a list of jobs that she ticks off on the way to doing something - she is well organised.

So we see they are quite clearly different characters. Our scripture shows that Martha is not happy because in her busyness she needs more help and Mary is not helping. I would like to describe that differently now. Martha wants Mary to become **like her** and help with lots of tasks. Mary could have said back to Martha "Why don't you become **like me** and come and sit down". So a fall out happens!

In this story we can see that if everyone became 'Marthas' all would be busyness with no one listening to Jesus. Or if all became 'Marys' everyone would be sat with Jesus so no food and drink would be had! Which means we need both Marys and Marthas to keep a balance.

The word balance is key here. In our scripture Jesus actually says Mary had chosen the better role today. If Martha is always a Martha and never a Mary, she will never sit down long enough to hear from Jesus. This does also work in reverse. If Mary was always sat down, she would not be able to eat and feed herself, therefore she will need to become a Martha at some point!

The question now is which character are you? Are you the busy Martha type who is work orientated? Or the laid back Mary who likes to sit and listen? Once you have decided which one of the characters is you - you will then need to think, "I am meant to be a bit of both characters", so ask yourself, what do I need to do in my life to adjust the balance?

"Be still, and know that I am God" PS 46:10

BUT don't be still forever or you will starve to death!

From the Home Front

Letting go of something from the past and moving forward can be very hard to do.

It is seven months since my Dad died and I have really struggled to come to terms with his loss. For over sixty years Dad was there whenever I needed him. He was funny and self-deprecating. He was kind, mischievous and generous with his time and money. He had had an amazing life. He was in the Home Guard before joining the Merchant Navy. He sailed in the Atlantic Convoys in WW2 and was torpedoed - surviving in a lifeboat for two weeks. He had taken troops to Italy as the Allies moved north into Europe seeing Mount Etna erupt. He sailed nurses to Bombay after they were rescued from attack; his ship was gunrunning into Greece in the fight against Communism, and he helped to transfer refugees from Yugoslavia. He sailed all around the world. He returned home safely and raised six children as a very hands on Dad (a modern man, way ahead of his time!). He moved to Trinidad with Mum and my little brother, where during the Black Power uprising, he helped to defend the neighbourhood. He was married to my Mum for over 73 years and was devoted to her until her last breath. He was immensely proud of his children, grandchildren and then great grandchildren. He was a keen cyclist, rugby player and bowler. He was a huge part of my life – then he was gone! Although I had no doubts as to his salvation – I didn't want him to be 'gone'...

After his funeral and cremation his ashes came back to me. He had requested that his remains should be scattered at sea by the RNLI. But as winter took hold this was not possible. But I had always promised that we would ensure his request was carried out – so when Spring belatedly arrived arrangements were finally made. But I felt bereft at the thought of parting with his last physical remains. He was 'gone' - but still here.... I felt a real desire to hang on to what remained of him. But on the appointed day he took his last car ride down to the Lifeboat Station. There all the brothers and sisters, in-laws, some grandchildren (even one from New Zealand) and a few great grandchildren watched his remains scattered at sea – just off shore from Richardsons and Westgarth former shipyard, where he served his marine engineering apprenticeship.

As the Lifeboat returned and tears were wiped away, it all felt so right. The weight of the past had slipped off into the sea too. His last request was fulfilled and it was time to move on. I no longer feel lost and bereft, but peaceful and thankful for all the years I did have such a wonderful Dad, and for an eternal Father who watches over me every day and whose love never dies. It was hard to give up the bonds of the past, the good memories can hold us back as much as guilt and sin; but God has plans for the future and I need to follow them without the bonds of loss holding me back.



I will by then have also had the privilege of worshipping with you for a couple of Sundays so we will know each other better. I am looking forward to working with you on this project and praying that new life will come out of these developments.

The upshot of this meeting is that, while my other friends will begin looking for their next job and their next church, the Bishop has asked me to stay here, in this parish, for the length of my curate's license (which expires in July 2019). It took me less than half a nano-second to accept this offer (in fact, I think I was already nodding and agreeing before he had even finished the sentence). And when he said 'thank you', to my acceptance, I was surprised; I am the one that should be grateful. I am the one that is really full of thanks!

So I am approaching these summer months feeling very positive and excited. None of us know what the outcomes of the deanery plan will be nor what the working together of the three 'central' parishes will look like, in reality, but we approach it together.

I love this town. I love our churches, very much. And I love each of you, dearly. So for another year of being able to walk on the beach, see our kitchen being built, say mass in our beautiful churches, and avoid trying a parmo...THANKS BE TO GOD!

BUILDING AND FABRIC OF THE CHURCH

Main developments this year:

Church Fabric

The old Church lighting has been replaced with LED dimmable lights now fitted in the main church and Fulthorpe Chapel.

The Quinquennial inspection has taken place and the findings reported to the PCC. There are several areas we have been advised to monitor re cracking but fortunately not a great deal of expensive repairs at this stage. Some masonry repair is advised to the porch. Some damp ingress at the corner of the choir vestry and nave and bell tower needs to be dealt with. The outer entrance and west doors have been oiled and this will be repeated in the summer. The internal entrance door has had the lower bolt straightened refitted but has been damaged again. A longer term solution to this will need to be found as forceful pushing from the porch has bent the metal and pulled the bolt away from the door damaging the wood. We are waiting for quotes to treat the woodworm in the loft areas. We need to exclude birds from the loft area over the north nave in particular. Some painting of outside guttering and pipes needs to be done in the summer and the kitchen and choir vestry also need repainting.

We have spent some time in thinking about improving disabled access to the chancel and Fulthorpe Cand have sought advice from the church architect, in the process of commissioning drawings for a faculty to move the doors into the chapel and place hand rails up the wall and also near the pulpit.

We are investigating improving access to the disabled toilet and bringing that up to the current standards.

The boiler, the fire extinguishers and the alarm have been serviced. The electrical inspection is now due and will be arranged.

Church Equipment

An inspection of articles and photographic records have been completed satisfactorily.

A log book is kept, and all alterations and repairs to the church are entered. We wish to give our thanks to the many people who unstintingly give time and effort to helping the church run; Sidespersons, Vergers, people who clean the church, carry out minor repairs and look after the garden.





Quick & Easy recipes

Banana Nutella Loaf

2 Bananas
140g caster sugar
55g butter/margarine
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
170g SR flour
½ teaspoon baking powder
4 tablespoons Nutella/chocolate spread



Pre heat oven to 190C (170C fan) & grease & line a 2lb loaf tin with greaseproof paper

In a large bowl, mash the bananas with a fork. Add the sugar, butter/margarine, egg & vanilla extract & mix until combined

Gradually add the flour & baking powder, mixing until all combined.

Pour half the batter into the loaf tin & smooth into the corners.

Warm Nutella in the microwave for 10-20 seconds to soften slightly. Drizzle a couple of spoonsful over the batter in the loaf tin before adding the remaining batter on top.

Drizzle the remaining Nutella on the top of the loaf before stirring the batter with a skewer to create a marbled effect.

Bake in preheated oven for 40 minutes until golden on top. Leave to cool in the loaf tin & serve in slices.

Moroccan Meatballs

450g lean beef mince
1 onion finely chopped
2 tins chopped tomatoes
2 garlic gloves
2 teaspoons ground cumin
1 teaspoon hot paprika
Salt & ground black pepper
Handful of fresh coriander
2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley
low calorie cooking spray



Place beef mince in a bowl & combine with parsley & half the cumin and paprika, and season well. Using your hands shape into about 16 small balls

Spray large frying pan with low calorie cooking spray & brown the meatballs. Set aside.

In the same pan gently sweat the onions & garlic for 2-3 minutes before adding remaining cumin, paprika and generous sprinkle of black pepper. Add tomatoes & simmer for 30 minutes.

Return meatballs to the sauce & heat through. Stir in coriander & serve.


