One Life Mission



As some of you know I was invited to participate in the One Life Mission trip to Newstead, Nottingham, with a small team from the Durham Diocese. Many of you kept the mission trip in your prayers for several weeks before, and I just wanted to say a big thank you to all who kept us covered in prayer.

The Archbishop of York was there for the mission along with our very own Bishop Paul Butler and 11 other Bishops from the north of England. Bishop Paul Williams, of Nottingham, welcomed us all at the

launch event, which took place at Mansfield Town FC. It was a penalty shootout, with a team chosen by the Bishops, versus a team from Betel, (a Christian charity that works to rescue people from addiction). It was a great kick off, (pardon the pun but I just couldn't resist©), to what turned out to be three exciting days of prayer, fellowship and spreading the Good News of the Gospel across the Nottingham diocese.

We prayed and worshipped together during a commissioning service which concluded with the Bishops and their teams being sent out to the four corners of the diocese to support local churches and take part in the events they had organised. They put on more than 400 events and activities and invited people along, and boy did they come – some of the venues were packed out. Events included, ladies' evenings, men's breakfasts, film shows, picnics, barbecues, school visits, fashion shows, Messy Church and prayer walks - to name just a few.

Throughout the trip there was an, almost, tangible sense of God's presence and the people of Newstead (where I was based) were so gracious and open to the power of the Holy Spirit. It was an absolute privilege to minister to and with them and made the mission trip a real blessing to all concerned. I visited jumble sales, spoke at Giggles women's night, made pizza's, with the lovely Rick Simpson, crafted, knitted and even worked on a market stall with Bishop Paul.

On the final evening of the mission trip the Archbishop of York shared his testimony, to a massive audience, at Newstead Miners Welfare club. His testimony included stories from his early life in Uganda, fleeing his country to escape persecution, and becoming 'Yorkshireman of the Year in 2007' in his role as Archbishop.

The threads which ran through the stories he shared were firstly; a powerful sense of the life and freedom that loving Jesus brings; secondly the importance of sharing God's story in our life

with others. This is my heartland, because as part of my role in my sending church was to work with the congregation and facilitate spaces and places where we could meet as a church family and learn to share our God stories with confidence and joy.

I absolutely loved my time in Newstead because the people of Newstead reminded me a lot of the people I have met since moving to the North East. They were warm hearted, kind in character, massive in spirit and wonderfully authentic, they were, as my lovely mum says, 'the salt of the earth.'

The trip was life giving and a great opportunity for all involved to be a witness to the Love of God and His faithfulness in their lives. One Life may have finished on Sunday 15th September but the mission is not over — many of the churches we worked with are now running nurture



courses and altogether there are more than 70 nurture courses planned, during the next few months to support people who expressed an interest in faith during the mission.

She lives high up in a no-through valley in the Scottish Borders, she has lived in the countryside for most of her life and believes firmly in looking after the environment. She always brings one of her working Labradors with her for company on her trips here. So each day she walks along Seaton beach to exercise the dog. She always takes some sort of bag with her and as she walks she picks up litter from the paths en route and debris dropped or washed up on the beach and then empties this rubbish into the correct bins on her way home. Some days she can hardly carry the bags as they are so full of fast food cartons, bottles, cans, papers, plastic bits and packaging of every shape and size.

We are also working through all the 'stuff' in my parents' house. It is amazing how much they, with my brother, have bought or been given, kept and not used over the years. How many rolls of sellotape, pairs of scissors, watches, drinking glasses, towels, batteries, torches, baking tins; never mind out of date foodstuffs and medicines etc etc, is needed by three people??? So many things were crammed into cupboards that it was impossible to see what was behind – perhaps that was why there were so many duplications!

With this in mind I followed suit and have started to declutter my house too.

Needless to say refugees, asylum seekers and charity shops plus Christmas Fairs have profited from these excesses. Only broken or unusable items found their way to the Council waste facility. There is still a lot more to clear....

As Christmas approaches all this clearing out has also made me realise how many Christmas presents were 'unwanted' and went unused over the years. As I begin to think about buying gifts this year I feel that I need to ponder more on just what is a gift – a token of love and affection for someone, chosen with thought and care – not for how much it cost, or how much it has been advertised as a 'much needed gift'! I would like my gifts this year to be used and enjoyed, to give pleasure and enjoyment – not to be put in the back of a cupboard....

Of course the greatest gift ever was given by God – His son to the people He loved. That is what we are celebrating at Christmas (and all year round). I intend to spend more time this Advent and Christmastide with the people I love and care for, rather than be sucked into a consumer driven buying, eating and drinking fest!

GENERAL ELECTION OPEN LETTER

Dear friends

We write to encourage everyone in our church communities to engage as fully as possible in the General Election process. We hope this letter will also be widely shared so that we can encourage all who are entitled to vote to do so. We believe it is vital for our long term health as a democratic nation that everyone plays their part by voting, so, if you are



entitled to vote by having registered, on December 12th vote.

We want to highlight what we believe need to be core common considerations over these weeks of campaigning.

LANGUAGE, TONE & TRUTHTELLING

Alongside many others we urge everyone involved in campaigning to take care with the language that they use of those with whom they disagree, and whom they wish to defeat in the election. Robust debate is important but this does not mean being disrespectful, rude or unkind. We plead for care in how we speak of one another. We ask for truth telling that is undertaken with humility and care for the other. Differing political views, and policies, are arrived at after considerable thought; so careful listening and critiquing are required from all of us.

We want therefore to encourage **hustings** to take place, if possible, on several occasions in each constituency. Churches and church halls are good venues for these and clergy, or leading lay people, should be able to chair impartially. Churches Together and inter faith groups are excellent bases from which to conduct these.

We also want to encourage children and young people's voices to be heard even though they do not have a vote. We hope schools will hold their own debates and mini elections. We encourage everyone to try and listen to their views in helping decide how best to vote.

CARE FOR THE MOST VULNERABLE AND NEEDY

When assessing different policies then care for the most vulnerable and needy is always at the heart of a Christian response. Will the poor be raised up? Will the disabled be respected and supported? Will children be cared for and educated well? Will the elderly be valued? Will the asylum seeker and refugee be treated with welcome and hospitality? Will the sick and dying be cared for and respected? We can arrive at different

judgments on what policies will be most effective in answering these but they ought always to be at the centre of what a policy seeks to achieve.

THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE NATION AND WORLD

The long running debate on Brexit shows us that different people have very contrasting views on what is best for the nation. Nevertheless, this is the question that must stay at the heart of our consideration though never seeking simply what is the best for our own nation at the cost of the wellbeing of our neighbours in other nations. This is also true as we consider the wellbeing of the planet. Climate change and how we respond as individuals and a nation should be a key area for us to consider in deciding how we vote.

PRAYER

As Christians we believe that prayer matters, and that the God to whom we pray is active in our world. So we should be praying daily for all those seeking election and for the whole process. We should also hold whoever forms the next Government before God in our prayers. So please include the election in the regular intercessions in services alongside in personal and private prayer. Some might even want to run 24/7 style prayer during the campaign. The Church of England has produced a prayer for the General Election and we encourage its use.

God of grace and truth, send your Spirit to guide us as we discover your will for our country. Help us to discuss the issues before us with courtesy, truth and mutual respect and grant that all who stand for parliament will seek to serve the common good through him who came not to be served but to serve Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

May we all hold our nation deeply in prayer. May we find a way of moving forward afresh as a nation together committed to the common good of all in our land, and the common good of our entire world. In Christ

There are invitations using the 'Follow the Star theme' available in church. May we each be alert to the opportunities this season may bring. When Christmas arrives there will be a second set of resources called '12 Days of Christmas Wonder'. These resources are deliberately accessible and will be available in a small printed book and electronically. In whichever way that works for each of us, may we indeed 'Follow the Star.'

Visit to Stranton by our Archdeacon, the Venerable Rick Simpson Sunday 17th November



It was good to meet Ven Rick, our Archdeacon, who was visiting Stranton for the first time.

He was preaching from two difficult passages – Malachi 4: 1-2a and Luke 21: 5-19 – they were very doom and gloom but he felt that within the words Jesus was speaking into the situation we find ourselves in today, especially relating to the General Election.

Jesus warns of upcoming catastrophes when people are overconfident.

Rick, like many of us has been appalled at language and violence used by politicians towards each other, which has permeated into how we as individuals speak

to others of differing ideologies and with opposing political arguments. The civility and respect (which are markers of civilisation) are no longer adhered to and this is just not acceptable or constructive to solve the issues existing in this country and across the world.

Many people are "too certain" that they have one sided answers, sound bite simplistic solutions to what are complex questions, which need patience and insight to unpick and start to resolve. The result is rising tensions, anger, intolerance, altercations and untruths. Therefore debates during this election time need to use moderated language, maintain the correct tone, and involve truth telling and honourable actions.

Jesus didn't promise that following him would ensure that everything was fine. He warns of bad times to come and problems for Christians – however we need to be faithful and truthful.

Rick suggested 5 ways to aid our listening, hearing and understanding during the run up to the election which will then aid sensible voting to benefit the majority.

Be willing to listen to views calmly and to listen fairly.

Be willing to remember many issues discussed are complex.

When you disagree with a leader or candidate be willing to see the good that is in these people.

In leaders and candidates you agree with allow yourself to be critical of views and comments – think with integrity.

Be determined to build up relationships with those you don't agree with.


It is with great sadness that we report the death, on Sunday 17th November, of our Dear Friend of the Signpost Magazine.

Food Banks are encouraging families, schools and workplaces to give as well as receive this festive season by starting a "reverse advent calendar", putting aside one item each day to donate to their local food bank before Christmas. The Trussell Trust, the UK's biggest provider of food banks, said the rollout of universal credit had led to a sharp increase in demand for its services this year, predicting this December "could be our busiest yet." An estimated 216,000 food items were donated in December last year due to the #FoodBankAdvent campaign, organised by the UK's online community of personal finance bloggers, who hope even more people will join in this year. "Food poverty is a very real issue in the UK so a reverse advent calendar is a fun way to

get friends, family and colleagues to do something about it," said Andy Webb, author of "Be Clever with your Cash" and founder of UK Money Bloggers. Faith Archer, author of the "Much More with Less" money blog, said that before starting a reverse advent calendar, donors should contact their local food bank to check which items were particularly needed. Every food bank will vary, she said, but most will have a glut of some products — typically baked beans and tea bags — but a shortage of others, such as pasta sauce and instant coffee. Donations of products containing alcohol or foods with short use-by dates will not be accepted. The Trussell Trust, which operates 428 food banks across the UK, emphasised the value of beginning calendars now and dropping parcels off by early December. This reduces the pressure on volunteers, giving them time to process and distribute emergency supplies. Emma Revie, chief executive of The Trussell Trust, said: "Christmas can be such a challenging time when you're facing hunger and poverty, so we're really grateful for all the extra donations that are made thanks to reverse advent calendars." "Reverse advent calendars are wonderful," said Jackie Humphries, centre manager of the trust's Bromley Borough Foodbank. "On our website we list the products where our stocks are low and local households and schools have lots of fun getting involved and putting something aside every day." Higher energy bills combined with the increased cost of extra meals while children are at home during the Christmas break means that many families in the UK increasingly rely on food banks. Between April and September this year, The Trussell Trust provided more emergency supplies to families year on year. "It's not right that people are being forced to use food banks after weeks of waiting for universal credit payments," Ms Revie said. "changes to the system haven't solved all of the problems food banks see, and they won't help people making new claims this winter. We're seeing soaring levels of need at food banks."

Mary Baines' Christmas Recipes

Easy Salmon dip

418g can salmon – drained 2x 5ml spoons freshly chopped parsley

200g carton full fat soft cheese salt, ground black pepper 4x 15ml spoon crème fraiche 1 clove garlic, crushed

2x 15ml spoons lemon juice Serve with vegetable crudités

Place all ingredients in food processor & blend until smooth

Spoon into a serving dish, cool in fridge until needed.

Garnish with parsley & serve with crudités

Spicy Nectarines

4 ripe nectarines

60g butter

30g light soft brown sugar

½ teaspoon mixed spice

1 tablespoon brandy or sherry (optional)

Peel & cut nectarines in half & remove any pips

Place nectarines in a buttered heatproof dish – cut side up.

Melt butter & stir in remaining ingredients, then generously brush over the fruit Place in oven or under grill brushing frequently with the butter until it is all used.

The nectarines with become soft and brown.

Serve with any juices left in the dish & single cream – delicious with shortbread biscuits

Truffles

60g quality dark chocolate 15g ground almonds 30g butter 120g icing sugar

½ tablespoon rum Chocolate strands or cocoa powder

1 egg yolk 15g cake crumbs

sweet paper cases

Melt chocolate & butter gently over a pan of boiling water.

Beat in the raw egg yolk & rum.

Remove from heat & add cake crumbs, ground almonds & icing sugar.

Turn onto a plate to cool & firm (in fridge if necessary).

Then roll into small even sized balls.

Finally toss half of the truffles in cocoa powder & half in chocolate strands.

Place in sweet cases

Alternatives to using rum: whisky or sherry or 1 tablespoon orange juice & the grated rind of half an orange.
