Thoughts on Advent

Yesterday I was sitting with one of our parishioners who is no longer able to come to church in person. We were chatting about how when we were children, it seemed so long from one Christmas to the next, but now it has no sooner been Lent and Easter than the summer has whizzed by and we are on our way to Advent. It is a sobering though when you reflect back on all the Advents you have lived through, and how many more are likely to come.

This kind of thinking could seem at odds with the spirit of the season, but in fact, this is just the kind of thing that the church draws our attention to at this time. Traditionally the focus of the season of Advent was not just waiting, but the four last things: death, judgement, heaven and hell. None of them top of our list of Christmas cheer and I am pretty sure that you will not find any of these things represented in the wider world as being the point of this season. And yet these have been the focus of these weeks of waiting for 2,000 years, so there must be something in them. I think that one of the jobs of the church in these times is to tell the truth about the things that the wider world is tempted to fudge over. And so I for one am glad that there is a time set aside in our calendar to think about the fact that none of us are going to live for ever (thank goodness). That as Christians we believe that we are accountable for our actions and that we can make of our lives a heaven or hell through those actions. But I think that the crucial thing when we approach these topics is to view them through the lens of the one we are waiting for - Emmanuel, Our Lord, the compassionate, the ever merciful. And when we look at these things - death, judgement, heaven and hell, through the life and death and resurrection of our Lord, they take on a different feel. framed in the light of eternal life with God, in heaven, however you understand that. Judgement and hell are framed in the unending care of our Good Shepherd, who offered paradise to the repentant thief and celebrates with feasting for the prodigal son, our Lord who entered into death so it would have power no longer and harrowed Hell itself.

It is by setting aside time to reflect on these four areas, that each year we are reminded of why the coming of the Christ Child into the mess and bewilderment we make of our lives and our world is indeed news of great joy. This is how we prepare our hearts so that when we sit in anticipation on Christmas Eve we can feel the awesome joy of the season as if for the first time, no matter how many Christmases we have celebrated before.

From the Home Front

As the days and nights have become colder recently I have noticed the berries and garden fruits have almost disappeared so I have begun feeding the birds again. I have a bird table surrounded by large squared mesh (to prevent the wood pigeons and magpies from eating all the food in one sitting), a pole with seed dispenser and fat balls accessible to small and larger birds plus dishes on which larger birds can perch. In addition I ground feed between pots so that the tiny and smaller birds manage to find food.

My first job when I come downstairs each morning is to put scraps, seeds and mealy worms onto the bird table and in the feeders, plus scatter some between my patio pots. The birds have realised already that this is a routine, so the wood pigeons are sitting waiting on the ridge of the greenhouse in anticipation of breakfast. As I scattered the ground food the other day a blackbird zoomed in to land on the bird table - to suddenly realise that I was still standing there - not sure who was the most surprised the blackbird or me? We eyeballed each other for a second or two before I slowly backed into the house and the Blackie could drop between the mesh for its mealy worms. Within minutes hopping around the feeding area were 2 wood pigeons, 5 blackbirds, sparrows, and some blue tits, with a magpie coming in later.

It seems that they were desperate for food after a cold night to fuel their bodies for the day ahead. But they knew where to find what they needed and at times they were prepared to face their biggest fears – humans – in order to get it!

That is how I see my life at times. I know what I need to sustain me in my faith and where it is, but I have to face my fears and trust in the Lord in order to find my anticipated spiritual food to protect me from the trails of daily life ...

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ

'The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it'. (John 1: 5)

I wanted to take this opportunity to write to you at this time of turmoil and soul-searching within our church following the publication of the Makin Review and the subsequent resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury. I do hope that many of you will have seen this statement that Dean Philip and I made and which was posted on the diocesan website:

"As the Acting Bishop of Durham and Dean of Durham our thoughts and prayers are with all who have been impacted by the abuse disclosed in the Makin Review. We lament the ways the church has not responded well both in the historic and more recent past. Safeguarding is the responsibility of us all, especially those of us in leadership positions. We understand and respect the Archbishop of Canterbury's decision to resign and our prayers are with him and his family at this difficult time. In Durham Diocese we work to continually grow our safeguarding culture and accountability in all areas of church life as we seek to witness, however imperfectly, to Jesus Christ."

Personally, I was deeply shocked by the suffering of victims and survivors documented in the Makin review and the safeguarding process failures that allowed the abuse to continue for so long. I am struck afresh by the difference we make to the lives of others by living out faithfully our safeguarding training, placing the needs and wellbeing of children and vulnerable adults at the heart of our church communities and authentic faith in Jesus Christ. I continue to be thankful for all our Parish Safeguarding Officers, our clergy and PCCs who invest so much of themselves in striving daily in our parishes to keep those who are vulnerable, young and old alike, as safe as possible. This Sunday, November 17, is designated as Safeguarding Sunday, giving an opportunity for all our church communities to reflect afresh together on this most searching of responsibilities.

Please be assured that I and the Bishop's Leadership Team, together with Beth Miller, our Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser, will be reflecting on, and learning from, both the Makin Review and the Scolding Review on Soul Survivor. The Diocese is also currently preparing for our Independent Safeguarding Audit which will take place in May next year and will help us continue to grow in our practice and effectiveness using the National Safeguarding Standards which you can find on the diocesan website.

Finally, please do pray with me for the searching light of Christ to shine into the darkness of this time and reveal what needs to be seen and dealt with, whatever and wherever that may be.

In August we held a successful 2 week holiday club for primary aged children at St Matthew's Community Centre which was fun, but busy. My thanks to all those who helped and worked so hard to ensure everything ran smoothly.

Since then all the usual weekly activities have restarted:

Toddlers

Regular assemblies continue to be taken in 5 primary schools.

There are 2 weekly RE Clubs one at Stranton Primary School and one at Jesmond Gardens Primary School. We do crafts, have a Bible story, play games and pray.

Relationships with the local young families continue to be built while chatting and serving drinks to those who come to St Aidan's Kitchen.

Café Craft for young families happened over the October half term at St Matthew's Community Centre and was really well attended. Families come for light refreshments, a chat, board games and crafts

As I write planning has begun for the Christmas activities. These include: Christingle Services at St Aidan's Primary School and at Stranton Church.

Christmas Celebrations for the whole of Jesmond Gardens Primary School and Stranton Primary School at St Luke's and All Saints, Stranton.

A two day Christmas Tree Festival at St Columba's, one day open to the public and another open to invited school classes. 
Also there are plans to start up a new family faith based initiative in the new year. Look out for more information nearer the time.

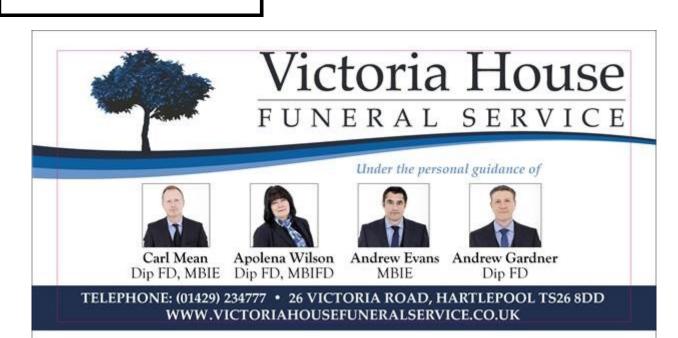

Gardening News – Winter

As I write, in late November, the weather has suddenly turned very cold and for me, not being one of those hardy souls who continue working in the garden whatever the weather, the gardening season is over for this year. I don't mind rain, but I draw the line at carrying on in the freezing cold. (In fact, I have today ventured out to do the weekly shop and judged that to be an act of heroism!) I have, however, managed to prune the roses and empty some of the pots and hanging baskets (apart from one, which is still resplendent outside the front door, boasting a magnificent red geranium even now) before hanging up my gardening tools.

The silver birch is now totally silver and Jet, the resident magpie, is still visiting, though not so often. We have also spotted a robin amongst the small birds now visiting the garden. Quite a few pot plants are still performing in the back garden, where it is more sheltered, and some of the bushes remain quite colourful, though needing some pruning themselves. That will have to wait till Spring, since we have run out of time and brown bin collections.

Apart from that, there isn't very much going on in my garden above ground, though I know that the roots and bulbs below ground are still working hard to keep going until Spring and Summer. However, I have recently visited a very famous garden, which has been on my bucket list (why is it called that?!)* and is much more exciting than my garden. The garden in question is Claude Monet's house and garden at Giverny, in Normandy. As it was October, I wasn't sure how many plants would be flowering, but there was still a lot of colour, with, among other things, many roses and even sunflowers still going strong.

The gardens are laid out in colour-themed borders in front of the house, including lots of pink and purple flowers, which were stunning. These lead down to the famous water garden, with its much photographed Japanese bridge, which inspired Monet's many water lily paintings. I was disappointed, but not surprised, that the water lilies were no longer flowering, but I have stood on the bridge (a replica of the original bridge) and enjoyed stunning views of the water lily ponds, weeping willows reflected in the water, plants of every colour and trees clothed in different shades of green, red and orange leaves against the background of the lush green grass. The house too is simply and colourfully decorated with large windows looking out over the garden and is full of copies of Monet's and other impressionist artists' paintings. On my return home, after trawling through a vast number of paintings on the Internet, and,

spoilt for choice, I ordered prints of some of his paintings to remind me of the beautiful sights I saw.


On the same trip, I visited several chateaux in the Loire Valley which had very beautiful formal gardens, one of which, Chateau de Villandry, was devoted mostly to colourful vegetables, but, lovely as these were, none could compare with the glorious, informal and natural planting of Monet's garden, which was more as nature intended. Our last stop before our return trip was a visit to the Palace of Fontainebleau, with more than 1500 rooms (and it felt like we'd been in in them all!), which was the home of many of the French monarchs and is where Napoleon abdicated before being exiled. My overwhelming impression of this palace was the luxury and opulence of every room we saw, which was in marked contrast to the living conditions of the people of that time. No wonder there was a revolution. And that brought to mind the contrast between the very wealthy and the very poor today, especially in the dictatorships of the modern world.

I am conscious that this is becoming more like a travelogue than an article on gardening, but it is for a church magazine, so I feel justified in adding that, as well as places devoted to mankind's comfort and pleasure, I saw some wonderful houses of God with spectacular stained glass windows, which are another, if man-made, vehicle for all the colours of God's colour palette. Strangely, I have a particular love of blue flowers (eg bluebells) and find blue stained glass also to be particularly beautiful.

I managed to miss all the recent appearances of the Northern Lights which others have witnessed and photographed, but a few days ago I did see a beautiful, very clear rainbow as I walked with a friend onto the sea front at Seaton and it seemed as if it had appeared just at that moment especially for us, a celebration in colour of God's blessings and promise of grace and mercy to us individually but also to all who see and believe.

*I had to find an answer to this question and Google told me that the term "was coined by the American and British screenwriter Justin Zacham in 1999 when he drew up 'Justin's List of Things to Do before I Kick the Bucket', which he shortened to 'Justin's Bucket List'." It's pretty obvious really, once you know, and now you do. I hope I get to do a few more things from my bucket list!
